

2023 SHPA ANNUAL REPORT

TRANSFORMATION

This year was defined by two momentous occasions for the Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia (SHPA) and the future of Australian pharmacy.

The return of Australia's largest scientific conference saw members, including leading pharmacists and technicians of all career stages and specialty interests, join healthcare partners and supporters in Brisbane last December.

Medicines Management 2022, the 46th SHPA National Conference (MM2022) was a triumph, with more than 1,100 in attendance and stellar conference program capped by a glittering gala celebration. The event saw the introduction of a new leadership team led by incoming President Tom Simpson who told delegates onstage that SHPA's best days lie ahead.

'On the very strong foundations of our recent past, where we go over the next few years will be even more important as we work to embed our leading programs and frameworks into the future of our profession.'

This paved the way for the Transformation 2024 agenda, released in July 2023, and the announcement of the Australian and New Zealand College of Advanced Pharmacy (ANZCAP) shortly after.

The landmark program will support pharmacists and technicians working in Australia and New Zealand to track and plan their career toward Resident, Registrar and Consultant (Fellow) recognition, conferring certification and use of ANZCAP post-nominals aligned with 40 areas of specialty practice (see pg 4).



KNOWLEDGE NETWORKS

More than two-thirds of SHPA Members now belong to at least one Specialty Practice Group, a new benchmark.

Highlights this year include the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health group publishing research on collaboration with other groups, facilitating greater cultural responsiveness across the membership. In April, advocacy led by the Compounding Services Leadership Committee saw changes to Therapeutic Goods Regulations to allow hospitals to compound medicines in anticipation of receiving a prescription, reducing the risk of patient harm due to delayed or reduced access to treatment.

ADVANCING PHARMACY EDUCATION

SHPA CPD, Australia's pre-eminent pharmacy education program, thrived this year with recorded attendance of 5,543 across 59 national events, an increase of 14%.

Member-driven moves to consolidate Branch activity by pooling national knowledge and ideas, and the return of more face-to-face opportunities, saw fewer Branch events this year and attendance of 1,824, down on heightened COVID-era figures in 2020-21 and 2021-22.



MEETING THE MOMENT

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Medicines Management, the SHPA National Conference is always a highlight of Australia's pharmacy calendar, but the 2022 event carried special importance and meaning. Under the lightning bolt theme of reconnecting and recharging, we saw more than 1,100 delegates descend on Brisbane for our largest ever conference program, capped by six inspirational award orations, to close the chapter on three years apart.

Alongside strong membership growth and a new edition of the essential *Australian Injectable Drugs Handbook* (AIDH), MM2022 helped drive SHPA to a positive operational result this year, further strengthening our foundations as we prepared for the next step in our 80+ year story.

In a pivotal time for Australian pharmacy, we continued to advocate the benefits of team-based care, which is increasingly supported across health care and by government as specialty pharmacy is embedded in the mainstream.

Why is this important? The evidence is clear. When pharmacists and technicians are supported to develop their specialty skills, they can contribute more to health care teams, support safer and more effective patient care and gain greater satisfaction in work and in life.

Collaborative care has always been the native environment of SHPA Members, and we are proud to invest in ensuring hospital-informed training creates more practitioners ready to thrive in multidisciplinary teams, surrounded by specialists and generalists from all healthcare professions.

Building a more advanced and agile Australian pharmacy workforce is the driving ethos of our 'Transformation 2024' agenda, a nine-point plan for supporting and recognising the unique skills and experience of every practitioner.



Through unprecedented investment in the Australian and New Zealand College of Advanced Pharmacy (ANZCAP) (page 4), specialty pharmacy more broadly (page 5) and better digital infrastructure evolving our identity (page 6), we are taking our organisation into a new era.

Importantly though, our advances do not happen in a vacuum. The College and key supporting programs have been informed by, and developed in partnership with SHPA members, who identify gaps in patient care and resourcing, shortcomings in our pharmacy workforce and key priorities for advocacy and education through our state and territory Branches and Specialty Practice groups.

I look forward to working with our members and peers as we build a more inclusive community, embrace pharmacy technicians in governance and in practice, embed recognition and engender respect through the new College, and advance the profession, together.

It has been an honour and pleasure to serve in my first year as President of our venerable organisation.

As this year comes to a close, I know our best days are still ahead.


In Jung



The Australian and New Zealand College of Advanced Pharmacy (ANZCAP) is the cornerstone of Transformation 2024, SHPA's agenda for the future.

Announced mid-2023, ANZCAP comprises an initial six-month Foundation Program that acknowledges prior professional experience, Training Programs supporting structured fast-track recognition over two years, and an Independent Program for anyone, anywhere to map their own path (see diagram below).


Over a series of releases toward the end of 2023 and into 2024, ANZCAP will guide pharmacists and technicians from Australia and New Zealand through an intuitive portfolio-building portal, enabling practitioners to build a career-long evidence library, and submit portfolios toward Resident, Registrar and Consultant (Fellow) recognition, conferring certification and use of ANZCAP postnominals, aligned with any one or two of 40 specialty disciplines aligned with SHPA Specialty Practice.



CLOSER TIES ACROSS THE TASMAN

ANZCAP was enabled through a new partnership between SHPA and the New Zealand Hospital Pharmacy Association (NZHPA), with both parties signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) in September 2023.

The MoU formalises a myriad of connections forged over a combined 150-year history supporting pharmacists and technicians providing care for Australians and New Zealanders, and paves the way for broader access to existing and new membership benefits for practitioners in the two countries in 2024.



ADVOCACY WINS

The third edition of *Pharmacy Forecast Australia* was the biggest yet, gaining significant traction in Canberra as a cornerstone of SHPA's advocacy activity this year, with key themes including trust and health literacy, medicines supply and sovereignty and operational agility and efficiency.

Previewed at a special event at Australian Parliament House in September, Pharmacy
Forecast Australia 2023 reiterated the importance of expanding patient-centred programs – many of which have been safely and successfully implemented in Australian hospitals – across clinic and community care settings.

The ongoing roll-out of pharmacist-led prescribing roles was one of 35 recommendations to help strengthen Australia's fragmented and inequitable health system, and a focus of showcase visits when SHPA hosted Health Minister Mark Butler at Adelaide's Lyell McEwin Hospital in July (below top, middle) and Assistant Minister Emma McBride at Mersey Community Hospital, regional Tasmania, in May (bottom), in partnership with SA Pharmacy and Tasmania's Statewide Hospital Pharmacy.

In Queensland, SHPA was instrumental in progressing a new state-wide pharmacist-led prescribing project, while in NSW powerful testimony at an inquiry into the impact of ambulance ramping led to in-principle support of SHPA's recommendation to increase the number of public hospital pharmacists in emergency departments, and SHPA has met with the NSW Health Minister's office to ensure these recommendations are carried out.

NSW joined ACT in formally announcing intention to sign a Pharmaceutical Reform Agreements with the Commonwealth, enabling patients to receive a 30-day Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) supply of medicines, in line with other states and territories, a key SHPA advocacy goal to ensure better healthcare equity.

The long-awaited Final Report of the S100 Efficient Funding of Chemotherapy Review was delivered, which SHPA has met with the Minister's office and the Department to discuss its findings and recommendations, and their impact on the viability of chemotherapy pharmacy services. Likely taking precedence for the Federal government however, are the 8CPA negotiations, which SHPA has for the first time ever, had recurring bilateral discussions with the Department of Health and Aged Care.

A NEW CHAMPION FOR DEPRESCRIBING

SHPA's inaugural MedsAware:

Deprescribing Action Week was held in August, raising awareness around polypharmacy and deprescribing, promoting to Australians the process of discontinuing medicines that are no longer required, or for which the risk of harm outweighs the benefits in the individual. The week saw a cumulative combined audience of 11.8 million across online news and social media, with more than 260 pieces of content shared.



GROWING REACH

The Society's Journal of Pharmacy Practice and Research continued to grow in reach and impact, attaining an inaugural Impact Factor of 2.1 as annual full-text article downloads increased by 27%.

The Australian Injectable Drugs Handbook

NINTH EDITION



RESPECTED, EVIDENCE-BASED INFORMATION

In July 2023 we released the largest ever Australian Injectable Drugs Handbook (AIDH), with the ninth edition of SHPA's essential frontline resource featuring more than 500 medicines, including 60 new entries, and paediatric information extended to cover 240 monographs, including intramuscular (IM) and subcutaneous routes for over 100 medicines.

The indispensable 'yellow book' has been comprehensively updated and now includes three new icons to help identify potentially hazardous medicines and time-critical medicines.







Upon its launch, SHPA President Tom Simpson noted AIDH has been a critical Australian healthcare resource for more than 25 years.

'AIDH provides health professionals with respected, evidence-based information in a comprehensive one-stop reference, assisting with best clinical practice and productivity.

'Every monograph has been reviewed by pharmacists and nurses to ensure information is correct, current and relevant to Australian practice, and I thank the 50-plus interdisciplinary members of our editorial and review teams.'

2022 SHPA AWARDS

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Professor Michael Dooley received the 2022 Fred J Boyd Award, recognising his impact as a pharmacy industry leader, researcher and innovator committed to improving patient outcomes across the reach of health care.

Duncan McKenzie was awarded the 2022 SHPA Medal of Merit, in recognition of his leadership and innovation in clinical practice and Tasmanian hospital pharmacy governance.

Deirdre Criddle was the recipient of the 2022 Australian Clinical Pharmacy Award, recognising her fierce advocacy for the recognition of pharmacists as medicines management experts and leadership in the critical transitions of care space.







MM2022 also saw our 2021 SHPA Award winners honoured onstage, with orations presented by Professor Jason Roberts (2021 Fred J Boyd Award), Kerry Fitzsimons (2021 SHPA Medal of Merit) and Sally Marotti (2021 Australian Clinical Pharmacy Award).

Benita Suckling (Qld) was honoured as the 2022 SHPA Early Career Pharmacist of the Year for being a driver of innovation and source of inspiration and mentorship for other early career pharmacists.



Katie Ambrose (Tas) won 2022 SHPA Technician of the Year in honour of her tireless contributions as the first technician to work in the newly created role of Statewide Pharmacy Technician Manager, setting up and overseeing the implementation and rollout of the Bedside Medication Management (BMM) Project in Tasmania.



The **BMM Project** was awarded the 2022 SHPA Hospital Team of the Year honour, having secured unprecedented funding for ward-based Pharmacy Technicians, to being introduced to all acute public hospitals in the state.



Rhiannan Froude (Vic) was awarded as the 2022 SHPA Resident of the Year for her research project on 'Hospital pharmacists' understanding of and attitudes towards beta-lactam allergies and delabelling.'
